

#### AN ORDINANCE

#### Chapter 8

#### Garbage, Trash and Refuse Article II

Section 8-27. Illegal dumping; penalty for same.

*Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the City of Taunton and by authority of the same as follows:*

**SECTION 1.** The second sentence of Section 8-27, Chapter 8, of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Taunton, as appearing, is hereby amended by striking the phrase “seven hundred dollars (\$700)” and replacing same with “three hundred dollars (\$300)”

**SECTION 2.** All ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage.

Dear Mayor Hoye, Councilwoman Quinn and Members of the City Council:

We, the fifth grade class of Room 118 at Friedman Middle School, would like to request your permission to name the spotted turtle wetlands which are adjacent to Friedman Middle School, **The Marjory Stoneman Douglas Turtle Sanctuary**. In our research, we discovered that Marjory Stoneman Douglas who was educated in the Taunton Public Schools, was the major advocate in protecting the Florida Everglades and is known as the "First Lady of Conservation" and "Mother of the Everglades." She has written seven books dedicated to this topic of saving the Everglades.

We were first made aware of this great Tauntonian in our Social Studies book entitled, *Building a Nation*. Our book talks about her

education in Massachusetts, but it does not mention any particular city. Our teacher, Mrs. Ruggiero, through her research, discovered that Marjory Stoneman Douglas, was educated here in Taunton from early childhood and then graduated from Taunton High School in 1908.

To spark our interest in pursuing this quest, our class took a nature walk to the location to view this site and realized that this wetland is unnamed which is a habitat to the endangered species of the spotted turtle. We became excited to think that maybe we could honor this great Tauntonian by making the community aware of her accomplishments and to be instrumental in naming these wetlands after her.

In our research, we discovered that Marjory Stoneman Douglas was born in 1890 in Minneapolis, Minnesota and moved to Taunton, Massachusetts in 1896 after her parents separated. She began her education at the Barnum Street Elementary School and then attended Cohannet Grammar School. In 1908, she graduated *magna cum laude* from Taunton High School where she wrote the Class Ode for her graduating class. In her autobiography, she mentions the excellent teachers she had in Taunton and credits many of them by name.

After graduating from Taunton High School, she furthered her education at Wellesley College where she received her Bachelor's Degree. She then went on to work at the Miami Herald, her father's newspaper and began her successful career as a writer of conservation. She fought hard against builders who wanted to drain the Everglades in order to develop commercial real estate. It was her recognition of the Everglades as a vital part of the environment and the biome to many plants and animals that made her a champion of conservation.

We would like to credit this conservation hero, who was educated here in our city and went on to be the voice of the Everglades with the

honor of naming the spotted turtle wetlands adjacent to our school, **The Marjory Stoneman Douglas Spotted Turtle Sanctuary** and would like to ask the Council to bestow this honor on this dedicated hero of the Everglades who had her educational foundation rooted here in the City of Taunton.

Thank you for your consideration, and thank you for allowing our request to be heard.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Ninety

AN ACT AUTHORIZING CITIES AND TOWNS TO ESTABLISH CERTAIN REVOLVING FUNDS.

Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to immediately provide for revolving funds in cities and towns, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 44 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after section 5JE, as appearing in the 1988 Official Edition, the following section:-

Section 5JE]. Notwithstanding the provisions of section fifty-three, a city or town may annually authorize the use of one or more revolving funds by one or more municipal agency, board, department or office which shall be accounted for separately from all other monies in such city or town and to which shall be credited only the departmental receipts received in connection with the programs supported by such revolving fund. Expenditures may be made from such revolving fund without further appropriation, subject to the provisions of this section; provided, however, that expenditures shall not be made or liabilities incurred from any such revolving fund in excess of the balance of the fund nor in excess of the total authorized expenditures from such fund, nor shall any expenditures be made unless approved in accordance with sections forty-one, forty-two, fifty-two and fifty-six of chapter forty-one.

Interest earned on any revolving fund balance shall be treated as general fund revenue of the city or town. No revolving fund may be established pursuant to this section for receipts of a municipal water or sewer department or of a municipal hospital. No such revolving fund may be established if the aggregate limit of all revolving funds authorized under this section exceeds ten percent of the amount raised by taxation by the city or town in the most recent fiscal year for which a tax rate has been certified under section

twenty-three of chapter fifty-nine. No revolving fund expenditures shall be made for the purpose of paying any wages or salaries for full time employees.

A revolving fund established under the provisions of this section shall be by vote of the annual town meeting in a town, upon recommendation of the board of selectmen, and by vote of the city council in a city, upon recommendation of the mayor or city manager, in Plan E cities, and in any other city or town by vote of the legislative body upon the recommendation of the chief administrative or executive officer. Such authorization shall be made annually prior to each respective fiscal year; provided, however, that each authorization for a revolving fund shall specify: (1) the programs and purposes for which the revolving fund may be expended; (2) the departmental receipts which shall be credited to the revolving fund; (3) the board, department or officer authorized to expend from such fund; (4) a limit on the total amount which may be expended from such fund in the ensuing fiscal year; and, provided, further, that no board, department or officer shall be authorized to expend in any one fiscal year from all revolving funds under its direct control more than one percent of the amount raised by taxation by the city or town in the most recent fiscal year for which a tax rate has been certified under section twenty-three of chapter fifty-nine.

In any fiscal year the limit on the amount that may be spent from a revolving fund may be increased with the approval of the city council and mayor in a city, or with the approval of the selectmen and Finance committee, if any, in a town; provided, however, that the one percent limit established by clause (4) of the third paragraph is not exceeded.

The board, department or officer having charge of such revolving fund shall report to the annual town meeting or to the city council and the board of selectmen, the mayor of a city or city manager in a Plan E city or in any other city or town to the legislative body and the chief administrative or executive officer, the total amount of receipts and expenditures for each revolving fund under its control for the prior fiscal year and for the current fiscal year through December thirty-first, or such later date as the town meeting or city council may, by vote determine, and the amount of any increase in spending authority granted during the prior and current fiscal years, together with such other information as the town meeting or city council may by vote require.

At the close of a fiscal year in which a revolving fund is not reauthorized for the following year, or in which a city or town changes the purposes for which money in a revolving fund may be spent in the following year, the balance in the fund at the end of the fiscal year shall revert to surplus revenue unless the annual town meeting or the city council and mayor or city manager in a Plan E city and in any other city or town the legislative body vote to transfer such balance to another revolving fund established under this section.

The director of accounts may issue guidelines further regulating revolving funds established under this section.

SECTION 2. For the purposes of establishing a revolving fund under the provisions of this act during fiscal year nineteen hundred and ninety-one, a town by majority vote of a special town meeting in a town, upon recommendation of the board of selectmen, or by vote of the city council in a city, upon recommendation of the mayor or city manager, in a Plan E city, and in any other city or town by vote of the legislative body, upon recommendation of the chief administrative or executive officer, may authorize the use of a revolving fund during said fiscal year; provided, however, that prior to such vote the finance committee in a town and the auditor or chief financial officer in a city designated by special law, General Law or ordinance, certifies to the assessors that the estimated revenue of the proposed revolving fund has not been used as a local estimated receipt, offset receipt, enterprise revenue or otherwise within the city or town's fiscal nineteen hundred and ninety-one appropriations.


